

Adverbs of Frequency

Adverbs of frequency come before the main verb, but after the verb to be.

- We hardly ever go out.
- She frequently forgets what she's doing.
- We don't usually eat fish.
- I rarely see Peter these days.
- We are seldom at home in the evening.
- **Is** he normally so bad-tempered?

Sometimes, usually, and occasionally can come at the beginning or the end of a sentence.

• Sometimes we play cards.

Never 0%

• We go to the movies occasionally.

The other adverbs of frequency don't usually move in this way.

• Always I have tea in the morning.
