## Either vs. Neither

## Either

Used to offer a choice between two possibilities.


- Either Mike or Lisa will be there.
- Either you leave me alone or I will call the police.
- We should bring either coffee or tea.
- You can either help us or go to your room.



## Neither

Equivalent to not + either.


- Neither Mike nor Lisa will be there.
- He speaks neither English nor French.
- We brought neither coffee nor tea.
- I will neither help you nor go to my room.

Neither and either are used to show agreement with negative sentences.

| Person A | Person B <br> NEITHER | Person B <br> EITHER |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| I am not hungry. | Neither am I. | = I'm not hungry either. |
| I'm not going to quit. | Neither am I. | $=$ I'm not going to quit either. |
| They don't speak French. | Neither do I. | $=$ I don't speak French either. |
| Mary didn't go to the party. | Neither did I. | = I didn't go either. |
| He won't stop talking. | Neither will you. | $=$ You won't stop either. |
| You haven't finished your meal. | Neither have you. | $=$ You haven't finished either. |

TOO + NOT = EITHER
WRONG $\rightarrow$ I'm not hungry tos (Too is for positive statements)
CORRECT $\rightarrow$ I'm not hungry either.
